

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

Strategic Statewide Resilience & Risk Reduction Plan

Planning Framework

- ☐ Disaster Relief and Resilience Act: directed SCOR to develop and implement the Strategic Statewide Resilience and Risk Reduction Plan
 - Framework to guide state investment in flood mitigation projects, and programs and policies to protect the people and property of SC from the damage and destruction of extreme weather events
 - Directed initial version completed by July 1, 2022 extended to July 1, 2023
- ☐ Working Definition of Resilience: The ability of communities, economies, and ecosystems within South Carolina to anticipate, absorb, recover and thrive when presented with environmental change and natural hazards




Vulnerability Assessment – Feedback Requested


- ☐ The Flood Vulnerability chapter assesses the current and future vulnerability of key locations across the state. This draft chapter will be included in the full Strategic Statewide Resilience and Risk Reduction Plan
- ☐ Uses First Street Foundation model & property level statistics to quantify the current and future vulnerability of key locations across the state
- ☐ Draft Document & Story Map
 - Quantify the number of parcels inundated by 1% annual chance flood event
 - Commercial loss associated with 1% annual chance flood event
 - Maps for both 2022 and 2052 1% annual chance flood event

Resilience in Comprehensive Plans

- □ Currently developing more detailed guidance for the newly required Resilience Element of Comprehensive Plans (SC Code 6-29-510).
- ☐ Legislative Requirements (one-pager on our website)
 - Considers the impact of flooding, high water, and natural hazards on individuals, communities, institutions, businesses, economic development, public infrastructure and facilities, and public health, safety and welfare.
 - Includes an inventory of existing resiliency conditions.
 - Promotes resilient planning, design, and development.
 - Shall be coordinated with adjacent and relevant jurisdictions and agencies.
 - Shall be developed in coordination with all preceding elements and integrated into the goals and strategies of each of the other plan elements.

Public Flooding Survey Response Dashboard




Total Surveys Collected


