HEDG History 2015 - 2024

2015 – MASC board set aside \$2.5 million from reserves to fund new economic development grant program

2016 – Board sold stock in VC3, valued at approximately \$1 million, to add to the grant fund

2017 – Board added a final \$500,000, bringing total "seed funds" to \$4 million





HEDG History 2015 - 2024

Grant winners have big plans

ght cities and towns across the state received \$25,000 Hometown Economic Development Grants from the Municipal Association. The grants will allow the cities to implement projects that will make a positive impact on the quality

An awards committee comprised of former local government and state agency professionals evaluated the 76 grant applications. Cities and towns receiving a grant are required to provide matching funds, submit reports about the progress and successes of each project, and provide financial details of how the grant funds were used.

- · The City of Beaufort's award will support a new public-private partnership to establish and manage the Beaufort Digital Corridor, described as "a community-sourced initiative to attract, nurture and promote the region's tech economy." In conjunction with the Charleston Digital Corridor, Beaufort's corridor will serve as a recruiter for high-tech companies, facilitate education and training for professionals, and help guide students and entrepreneurs seeking a career in technology.
- · The City of Clinton will hire an architectural firm to create a professional master plan and strategic vision for the Industrial Supply Company warehouse complex, which occupies an entire city block in downtown Clinton. Because the city owns a portion of the site, future development will involve public-private partnerships.

- the success projects in City of Gaffney will Street Challenge Compe-tition to recruit new businesses. The Gaffney Business Generator project, Gaffney Main Street and the Gaffney Downtown Merchants Association program will all assist with the city's program.
- · The City of Manning will take the next step in the city's Retail Recruiting services firm to help the city develop a retail recruitment strategy, marketing data and trade brochures for use at
- The Town of Ridgeway intends to "Paint the Town Red with Revitalization" and restore and repair iconic structures in the town, including the World's Smallest Police Station, its famous telephone booth and Ridgeway Arch, which anchors the proposed Ridgeway Park.
- · Known as the gateway to the ACE Basin, the Walterboro Wildlife Sanctuary is the second-largest municipal park in the United States. The City of Walterboro will use its grant funds to develop a city-owned building to use as an interpretive Wildlife Sanctuary Discovery Center.

Bigger cities rarely apply and rarely win

Since 2016, 105 grants awarded to 89 different cities/towns (only 33% of members)

Spartanburg (11th largest) is largest to ever win a grant (2017)

Things to Remember


- Each city may only apply for ONE of the two programs each year
- Each city may only submit one application each year
- A city may be awarded a grant once every third year



Things to Remember

- Grant funs MUST be spent within 24 months of award
- Grant funds are reimbursable must spend city/town funds
- Deadline to spend funds awarded this cycle is December 31, 2027

The Municipal Association of South Carolina launched the IMPACT Fund, an acronym for "Innovative Municipal Projects for Advancing Change and Transformation," in 2025. The program is supported by the Association's strategic partner for technology services, VC3.

The Fund finances two distinct grant programs for South Carolina cities and towns:

Problem Solver Grants - \$25,000 – Designed to fund smaller, more routine municipal projects and practical fixes for common problems facing South Carolina municipalities. These grants may fund repairs or upgrades to municipal facilities, comprehensive or strategic plans, hazard mitigation projects or anything that addresses a challenge and enhances daily life for municipal residents or employees. Grant judging criteria includes need and is generally focused on small-to-medium size cities and towns with financial challenges.

Big Idea Grants - \$100,000 – Designed to fund bold, creative and forward-thinking ideas. Projects might include technology-driven service improvements, innovative uses of public space, community-wide initiatives or any other big idea that results in long-term impact. Grant judgin criteria is heavily weighted toward creativity, community impact and project readiness.

The Association may award up to eight Problem Solver Grants and up to two Big 2025.

The 2025 application deadline is September 26, 2025.
